Last February I was in Switzerland for the meeting of the Directing Committee of pax Romana-MIEC and we spoke about your problems of apostolate work in Africa, All the people in the D.C. are very interested in helping the African students as well as they can.

I write to the chaplain but I must say that I prefer to change news with the students, because the chaplain, although being the responsible for their work, is not, by nature, the leader of the laymen's apostolate. Do you think so?
