MAN AND CIVILIZATION: THE POTENTIAL OF WOMAN

January 25-27, 1963

Woman's independence is one of the major achievements of the Twentieth Century. Since the disappearance of an alleged matriarchy in prehistoric Greece, women in western civilization have been compelled to seek adequate modes of self-satisfaction in dependent relationships with men. Their status has varied through the centuries but never until now have they had the opportunity to define themselves as independent, self-determining individuals—fully human, since self-definition is the capacity marking human beings off from the rest of the universe.

However, this change has taken place with enormous rapidity; its efforts have only become general since about 1920. The very speed of this development has prevented assimilation. Society has simply not had time to develop appropriate roles for and attitudes toward the independent woman. And many women have found themselves suddenly deprived of the security implicit in dependence, without being offered the means to achieve real independence.

A minimal objective of this symposium is to define some of the questions that society must answer if the generality of women are to live full and useful lives in the freedom that the Twentieth Century has brought them.

This symposium brings together authorities from many disciplines in an effort to focus understanding and research needs for the present and future. It is presented by the University of California School of Medicine, and the Department of Continuing Education in Medicine and Health Sciences, University of California San Francisco Medical Center.
