Project on social movements
- 1 One of the key-questions in the management of democracy is the capacity to give institutional dimensions to existing social movements. They represent in today's world the capacity of blending traditional democratic institutions with new forms arising from the information society. At the individual level, they are perceived as a way to overcome the alienation created by the mechanisms of the representative democracy.
- 2 Social movements are originated in the awareness of societal issues which concern directly a certain potential group of citizens. Regardless of their previous ideologies, those citizens inaugurate another form of intervention in society. They reshuffle the political party lines. Hence the difficulty met by the social movements to enter decisively in the decision-making process of society.
- 3 For a period of 10/15 years the social movements appeared as "protest" movement. They said whatever their concern was in a negative mode. Their expressions - more imaginative, more symbolic than the traditional mass movements of the representative democracy - add to that protest a note of novelty. This doesn't go without a certain perception of marginality by the current powers. Hence, the traditional problem of the "political status" of the social movements.
- 4 Many social movements present still a fragmented existence in space, a sporadic intervention


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in time. Their internal coherence doesn't resist often to the dominating powers of the bureaucratic state, of the ~~conservative~~ society. And yet, they are the basis of what some are calling with perseverance "the Third system", namely, a system which goes beyond the traditional ideological dichotomies of capit.-vs.-soc. This Third system is but one emerging reality in the political scene. ~~The~~ The freshness of its approach and the work it has accomplished so far create new hopes + establish a sound basis for new democratic institutions.

⑤ Some questions remain acutely raised for the social movements to find the adequate institutional expression in the political field. We may state that the key-questions are the following:

- a) grass-root nature of social movements as expression of direct democracy and tremendous need for leaderships which prevents division in numberless factions;
- b) definition of clear-cut boundaries of ~~the~~ specific issue vs. global approach of all problems in ~~the~~ planetary awareness (global village)
- c) social movements as born of the shortcomings of the present forms of democracy vs. information society as only framework capable of giving to social movements their dynamic preventing them from falling into the traps of present forms of democracy



II. Relevancy In European / Portuguese society

- ① Sprouts of social moves have come up in many & ways in P^t after the 25th April '74. They have taken & forms & had a "glorious" moment in 76/76. The political parties have, however, been their presence as "opposition" though they have borrowed many of the ideas the social moves presented.
- ② The forms taken by the marginalisation of the emerging social moves have been varied, & subtle:
- a) lack of subventions or lack of adequate legislation from the State;
 - b) privileges of "clients" of political parties at the expenses of the acknowledgement of the importance of new grass-root groups + associations;
 - c) open criticism and ostracism using the media as a vehicle to manipulate public opinion;
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- ③ The evolution of Port. society shows in a naked form, the incapacity of ~~most~~ traditional democratic institutions to pave the way for development, for a better life for all citizens and for an essential interaction with political groups in today's world.

- ④ The awareness of such situation led some well-known personalities to take the following steps:
- a) in Jan '81 - establishment of a platform of emerging social moves, in order to reach, from the effective social practice of each of them, the global issues at stake;



Jan '81 - Jan '83 — different attempts to consolidate
such a platform and to reach consensus on
~~burning~~ issues of P. society (integration in EEC,
choices in type of energy, ecological environ-
ment, regionalisation) were made through
regular meetings & research work and
sharing of experiences;

'March '83 — public statement "Por um
profundo da democracia" as a joint
declaration of the groups + associations
concerning the chaotic situation of the
Port. democracy + its inability to answer
to the needs of the people

May '83 — creation of the "Movimento p.º o
profundo da democracia" which was
intended to gather together individuals
+ groups involved in ~~the~~ embryonic forms
of the ~~third system~~, a social movement

May '83 - Oct '84 — several attempts to respond
to the statutory obligations of the Movement
and yet jeopardized by the combined
effect of: continuous attack from the press
+ political parties, absence of firm leader-
ship, interference of the emerging question
of presidential elections

Oct '84 - Jan '86 — coalescence of the efforts of
individuals linked to many groups +
associations into the work + structure
the electoral campaign of O.P.



⑤ As MP lost the elections, a great democratization followed for the ~~free~~
masses of participants. However,
in 8 of the 18 districts of the country,
political associations have been
formed

Objective of the project

To create the (research) study environment necessary to provide the emerging social movements with the basic tools to take their place in the information society and to express themselves in the new categories of such a society.

In this way, it is hoped that these social movements may create new forms of democracy + express themselves so as to be able to answer to the needs of the Port. people.



Organization of work

- ① The Institute will deal with the theoretical framework for the development of the social movements. (political association).
- ② ~~In~~ The priorities of the social movements will be taken up as subjects of research, in so far as they will relate specifically with the information society (impact of new technologies, blending possibilities in concrete cases etc.).
- ③ The main focus of the interaction Institute/social movements will consist on a process of global learning designed by the Institute and at the service of the people involved in the social movements.
- ④ Such an approach will imply:
 - a) that there will be regular meetings between leaders of social movements + director of project at Institute + researchers.



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- b) that the researchers will provide the members of the social movements with the results of their work, in academic form
- c) that each researcher ~~will be~~ committed to the production of material for global learning of members of social movements and ~~in~~ the people they reach;
- d) that regularly (twice a year) the researchers will meet with the field workers so that mutual questioning may happen
