Dear Prime Minister,

I was thrilled and proud to read of your appointment as Portugal's first woman Prime Minister.

I have just taken my seat in the newly elected European Parliament, representing the lightands and Islands Constituency of Scotland as a member of the Scottish National Party. My constituency is the largest in Europe, larger than Belgium, and contains vast rural areas with regional problems, and almost 100 inhabited islands.

I think it appropriate that from that far away corner of Europe, I send my affectionate graetings and congratulations to you in your country which may be joining the European Community in the course of time.

In my opening speech, which I made on behalf of the E.P.D. group, I said that in the Chinese style of naming years, this should be "Europe's Year of the Woman". We have a woman presiding over the Parliament. The introductory and learned address was given by the oldest member, a formidable lady of 86 years, who addressed her Assembly as "Mes enfants". Having become 50 a few days ago, this, as you can imagine, was rather delightful, as it also was for many members of the Assembly, many of them older than I am.
